Why Supercourse needs your support: Personal plea from Faina

I have been with the Supercourse team for more than 11 years. In that time, the Supercourse library has grown from 167 lectures to over 5000 lectures and the network has increased from 5,000 to over 50,000 members. Most of the work in the Supercourse is being done by volunteers like you from all over the world, especially our 1,530 authors, translators, Just in Time team, and many others. Central Asia: We are moving quickly in Central Asia to help build research capacity. We are working closely with Nazarbayev University to build a network for the region, establish a Central Asia Supercourse, build a journal, and establish a workshop to build strength in research. We currently have 60 members from Central Asia. History Supercourse: Eric Marler is busy creating a History Supercourse. We are collecting all the PowerPoint lectures about history as well as the videos. Soon you will be able to go see the Royalty England in 1852 on YouTube, be a part of Napoleonic wars, learn about the building of the Great Wall of China, and help to stamp out Yellow Fever. You can then teach a course on SARS in China, and use PowerPoint slides to illustrate its flow on the Silk Road. This likely will be the largest collection of historical materials on the web. I am pleased to say we have about 80 "history buffs" who will be great to talk with when some of us retire! It will be fantastic to build linkages between health and history, or just study history for histories sake.
