Death of Scientific journals: In 1995 we published a very controversial piece in the BMJ arguing that because of the Internet, scientific journals were dead, or should be dead. However we did not know how they would meta evolve. Perhaps we do now. About 1500 people subscribe to the American Journal of Epidemiology. When we publish in AJE, perhaps 10% will read my article, or about 150 people. The journal BMJ has a circulation of 150000, when I publish there about 15000 people read my article. The goal of publish is to inform other scientists, not to make Elsevier lots of money. With our H1N1 lecture, over 50,000,000 became aware of our work, with mVETs, over 3 million. I have published 5010 articles, in Science, Nature, BMJ, Lancet, etc. Yet all the readers of my work combined are considerably lower than either our H1N1 or mVET. We translate our message to many more people. We submitted the mVET article to JAMA and were turned down. If it were published in JAMA about 20,000 people would have read it. If we put it in the Supercourse, and share it worldwide, at least 3 million people have seen it and growing. The roots of scientific publication are dissemination, not to get tenure. Lectures and viral sharing using social marketing may be the new scientific communication.
