This will appear in the Christmas edition, we argue that PowerPoint will take over biomedical research communications. It will be most fun as we are going to put up our journal article also as a PowerPoint file, and we will query people, as to what is the best form of research communication.

Disability and Access to science: We have been looking at various approaches to "sound" PowerPoint slides. People with impaired vision or who cannot read have very little access to the world's scientific literature. We see several means by which we can machine sound the lectures so that your lectures can be read to people, and sight would not be needed.
