When I decided to write about one of the best novels of Mark Twain I was afraid that I won't give that story enough credit, that it surely deserves, but I will do my best!

Mark Twain's has put basic principles in novel writing The accurate description of the main characters, the attention to the surrounding environment, the very good use of details to make the reader witness an important stage of America history, the trenchant social analysis through the interaction of the persons and era that thankfully now gone! His father didn't do any thing to enhance his life, he became a burden on his child!

My second stop will be with the thieves, they met on their way, those who joined them on their little raft. Unlike Huck, those two thieves represent all the defects of human nature, they are greedy, lazy, cold hearted. They had a dead conscience. As much as I would like to do so, I can't blame those thieves only. I surely, blame the naive people who made their job easier. If they had met people who use their brains a little bit, they wouldn't have been able to abuse them as they have done.

The village people shushed the one person that tried to warn them up. The entire Village judged the book by its cover and decided to put their trust in those strangers. Is it a coincidence that the little girl didn't believe them? Or the children always had a very strong intuition that helps them in judging people!

My third stop will be with the "Revenge Village" Two families have been killing each other for decades for absolutely no rational reasons. What could possibly be the reason for killing another human; another soul. In my opinion there isn't a reason on earth! Both families didn't have one sane person to ask the reason why, or who could stop this bloodshed! Not a single soul tried to stop this chain of nonsense. They do not even know why they are doing all that! When Huck asked his buddy Buck why they are carrying guns and killing each other, the young boy replied that nobody knows how the whole thing started! They just know that they are destined to keep killing each other! Sophia was the only one who decided to escape, break those hatred rules and marry the one she loved but like anyone who decides to stand up for what they believe in, there

were consequences ...a massacre broke out and Buck the young innocent boy was one of its victims. The lesson that we learn from this Village is when you follow outdated traditions, shut down your heart and soul and be fulfilled with blind hatred there will be always be a price to pay, there will be always victims.

My Fourth and last stop will be with the kind man "Jim" the black slave who was seeking desperately for his freedom the thing that made him escape from his owner and face the death penalty or worse!
