This article is publishing of two papers of Coptic manuscript Number 146 in Paris, and will provide a description of the manuscript of what came in the catalog Dolabor, and finish what had begun by Oswald Burmester for nearly three-quarters of a century. Many studies did not show in this thread. what caught my attention in this manuscript is distinct from the printed text that reflects a tradition locally unknown, the copier of Lower Egypt, but lives in Upper Egypt. He has published the text of the Coptic and Arabic text in the manuscript, which appears to be much longer in the Arabic text than the Coptic text.
