PHILIPPE DESMARESCAUX INTRODUCTION SPEECH – BIOVISION ALEXANDRIA 2004

Foundations like ours and many others are here to catalyse and cement these priorities, with a growing understanding that a progress **not equally shared** is a step backward more than anything else.

The future is no longer what is used to be: putting together on an equal footage Science, Society and Industry is the "Secret Recipe" of BioVision ... and we count on your active participation during the coming days, here in Alexandria, to start building up the necessary network leading to concrete actions. And please, during your many contacts in the next days: no fiddling around, you certainly do not have to agree on everything with everybody; but however, please keep in mind at all time that you have huge responsibilities regarding the future and it is everyone 's duty to address doubts, reduce disagreement, define priorities and underline precautions to be taken. Diversity in opinions and cross-breeding of ideas will lead to unexpected opportunities, again to the benefit of both the developed and developing nations.

We do not only have the moral obligation of preparing the future, but also the duty of repairing the past: Wealth & Health in a secure environment are at stake, and the development of Life Sciences will contribute to this evolution, if not this Revolution...
